Penryn beaten at their own game

Penryn 8pts., Carnegie College 11.

IN one of the finest games on the Penryn ground this season, both teams made the most of every chance to open up attacking moves in a full-tempo display.

The students virtually beat Penryn at their own game.

Conspicuous in the College side were former Falmouth Grammar School players Dave Williams at No. 6 and No. 8 Ian Elvin, as well as full-back Gordon Meadows.

Left-wing threequarter John Mynett touched down for the first try against Penryn since October after hooker Roger Harris had kicked a penalty, and at half time it was 3-3.

A delightful Penryn move in which centre Dave Thomas, No. 8 Steve Andersen—who both had excellent games—and winger Peter Webber had a share, sent second-row forward John Blackburn over with a try for Harris to convert.

But then Penryn slackened and the students snapped up their chances. Meadows put over a penalty and then started a break which ended in second-row forward Brian McLennan touching down for Meadows to convert.

Revival comes too late to save Pirates

AFTER leading 6-0 at the interval, Carnegie went on to win convincingly, but had Penzance-Newlyn shown throughout the game the form they displayed in the final 20 minutes, there might well have been a different verdict.

The contest was territorially even in the first half, with the forwards well matched. Carnegie went into the lead with a magnificent angled penalty goal from the halfway line by forward Gordon Meadows, who kicked another before the interval.

Penzance-Newlyn put up a storming finish to the first half and kept the College confined in their own half for much of the second period.

But Carnegie went further ahead following a short penalty on their own "25." The ball was worked down the line to the wing who kicked ahead. Despite a good tackle in front of the posts, the ball came out to wing forward Dave Williams who scored under the bar. Meadows converting.

TRY DISALLOWED

The Penzance-Newlyn try followed a scrum near the line. Scrum-half Geoff Rogers fed number eight forward Keith Sterling, who was brought down. The ball went loose and Penzance-Newlyn dribbled it over for Rogers to get the try.

Rogers had a try disallowed, and Charlie Paull missed a long-range penalty attempt, before a College breakaway ended with Williams going over in the corner.

Strong home pressure saw Peter Marks and Sterling come very close to scoring, and there was some strong running and good combined work by the forwards.
